Following on from last week’s work on suffixes, we are going to learn about prefixes.

A prefix is a string of letters that are added to the beginning of a root word, changing its meaning. Each prefix has a meaning (for example, un- means not, sub- means under mis- means wrong or badly).

Look at the table of prefixes, the meaning of each prefix and an example.

Finish the table by writing your own sentence including the example prefix.
